The Preliminary Stages of A Scoping Review of the Intersections of the Training and Implementation of Peer Supporters in Clinical Early Psychosis Intervention Mental Health Teams

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Introduction

- Peer support in clinical early psychosis intervention (EPI) programs is important, but how are they trained and implemented in the EPI context?
- While PSW roles and activities vary depending on their setting and context, initial peer support training programs tend to be generalist in nature [1], and training specific to the role of peer support in the EPI context is lacking [2, 3].

Materials & Methods

- This scoping review project will map existing knowledge on training and implementation of peer support services in early psychosis intervention programs in British Columbia and Canada.
- The search strategy for the scoping review is informed by meetings with a **Peer Support Reference Group** composed of peer supporters in early psychosis programs in British Columbia.

Preliminary Themes and Search Terms

Unclear protocols around mitigating risk (e.g., suicide intervention, duty to report, note-taking and documentation, etc.)

Simultaneous co-optation (e.g., being expected to act like a clinician) and devaluation of peer support (e.g., not being provided the same level of onboarding training as clinicians)

> The importance of relationships

Moving Away

from what's not working

Moving Deeper

into what is working

Navigating how to honour the values and ethics of peer support while on a clinical team (e.g., use of language; navigating power dynamics; peer support community of practice)

Moving Towards

> what might work

(Universal?)

workplace mental health support and accommodations (that other staff may also benefit from)
